MEET THE 2022 MCKINLEY HIGH SCHOOL FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

Meet the 2022 McKinley High School Foundation Scholarship Recipients. Part of the application process for the recipients requires that they write a brief essay on one of the following: "What advice would you give your freshman self?" or "How has gratitude motivated you?". Below is a summary of their responses.



Johnathan Le: Johnathan is described by many as a student who is not only academically gifted, but very much involved in many extracurricular activities such as the KCC Pharmacy Technician Program, Math Team where served as Team Captain, Center for Tomorrow's Leaders, Science Bowl, Science Fair and many others. Although he always valued education, he realized early on that he had a passion for science. With the guidance of a mentor, a college professor, he was able to grow his passion and form his future aspirations and goals which led him to place 1st in his category in the state Science Fair. For many of his science projects, Johnathan works hard to incorporate ideas to benefit others. For example, for his Capstone project, his project was a glove that had sensors so that those that are blind can feel and sense things such as a heat source. His empathy towards others was evident to many around him, as a teacher noted that "He cares about his community and strives to make McKinley High School the best. I have no doubt that he will continue his passion in his post-secondary career and will continue giving back to McKinley once he graduates". Johnathan will be attending Stanford University. He is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Eyvinne & Kay Lee in the amount of \$7,500.



Emily Lei: An introvert by nature, Emily stated that the "best advice I'd give my freshman self would be to 'be more open'". As a new student at McKinley High School with many of her elementary and middle school friends attending other high schools, she had to start over from scratch. Although finding it difficult at first, a kind word from a student that she didn't think was her friend helped her tear down her wall and open up to those around her. Her willingness to reach out and try new things have led her to be very active, participating in many activities such as Center for Tomorrow Leaders where she received an honorary certificate from City Councilmember for her project in helping local restaurants during the pandemic, the National Honor Society, Science Bowl, DECA, Science Olympiad, Ignition and Secretary of the Future Farmers of America. Emily also maintains an impressive academic record while also taking care of her younger siblings after work. A teacher has stated that she is "A leader by example, is never one to complain no matter the challenges that stand in front of her. Rona's high academic aptitude can be seen when she competed in the Agricultural Demonstration Oahu District Competition for Future Farmers of America with her project of identifying Ti leaf diseases. With input from Dr. Goo from the US Department of Agriculture, her research placed her first in the competition and represented Oahu in State competition. Rona will be attending the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Eyvinne & Kay Lee in the amount of \$5,000.

This quote perfectly describes Aniqua and her altruistic characteristic by her involvement with the school and community. Aniqua has been involved with the Student Government since her sophomore year, and as the Student Body President she has adapted to the challenges of the pandemic and successfully guided her class through the year. She lead virtual welcome-back-to school assemblies and helped put together a winter extravaganza which featured a sledding hill built by show donated by a local ice company. She is also involved in many other activities such as the Center for Tomorrow's Leaders, National Honor Society, Environmental Club, Presidents Society, Orchestra and Science Olympiad. Her teacher has stated that "her compassion and ability to motivate, inspire and lead others that truly make her stand out from her peers". Hannah will be attending University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of the Alexander & Baldwin/Matson Inc./Robert J. Pfeiffer Community Scholarship in the amount of \$5,000.



Emily Kwong: Emily is an individual who holds herself to a high standard both at school and at home. Her days are filled not only with classes and homework, but also with her myriad of extracurricular activities, leadership roles and helping her family business. She has been involved since her freshman year with Center for Tomorrow's Leaders where she is Team Lead, Key Club where she serves as Vice President and Leo Club. She has also been extensively involved with National Honor Society, Art Club, Ignition, We the People and Math Team all while working at her family business and taking care of her younger siblings. She has been described by her teacher as a privilege to teach, and a "high-performing, kind, patient and compassionate student in ways that make her stand out from her peers".

Throughout her school career, Emily has learned about the importance of striving for excellence, setting boundaries, speaking up for herself as well as balancing her time for her interests. However, she has stated that one of the greatest lessons she has learned is "I am grateful you gained the courage to help yourself". She will be attending University of California Los Angeles. She is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Abrahm & Shin Quon Wong Goo in the amount of \$4,000.

Katherine Liu: As a young adult entering high school, many is faced with fear and uncertainty of the future. As a high achiever, Katherine had the goal to be a well-rounded student and to excel both academically and in extracurricular activities. With the pandemic and in person closure, Katherine was able to self-reflect and realize that the path she chose for herself may not be what she wanted in life. This led to her project of designing a wheel chair that is efficient and portable for individuals who are traveling by plane. Besides being involved in the classroom, she is also involved in many activities such as National Honor Society where she serves as Vice President, Center for Tomorrow's Leaders, Tiger Locker, President's Society, Environmental Club, LEO Club and the McKinley Band. She will be attending Chaminade University. She is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Abraham & Shin Quon Wong Goo in the amount of \$4,000.



Phuong Doan: Phuong describes her freshman self as shy, insecure and soft spoken. Despite this, she was able to flourish and grow while maintaining a high-grade point average. She was on the JV and Varsity Tennis and Soft Tennis team for four years, where she was the Most Inspirational Athlete for Girls Soft Tennis in 2020 and Most Inspirational Tennis Player in 2021. She served as the President of the Mock Trial Team during her senior year, was the Secretary for DECA, Secretary for the Student Body Government during her Junior year, accepted in the National Honor Society where she was the Secretary as well as participated in the Business Academy and Go Green Club. Although academically gifted and participating in many activities, her teacher states that "Having compassion and getting to know others is Phuong's strongest qualities. Phuong will always try to socialize and to make a person feel welcomed in any occasion". 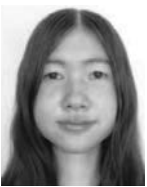

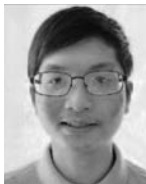

However, by participating in the Math Team, he was able to grow and in his Senior Year became one of 4 captains. His teacher states that "When other captains wavered, he picked up the slack. As the year went on and the team members got more familiar with each other, I have noticed students looking up to William more often. Whenever they wanted to vent, they sought him out". With the support of Mrs.

Okagawa, William states that "Following the footsteps of someone so great is what changed me for the better". He will be attending University of Hawaii at Manoa. He is the recipient of the Edward and Itsuko Takamura Scholarship in the amount of \$2,000.



Cora Liu: Being involved while maintaining her grades is something that Cora strived to do while at McKinley High School. Since her freshman year, she has been involved in many activities such as the Leo Club, served as Treasurer for the Pen Pal Club, Future Farmer of America, Math Team, Environmental Club and also the Go Green Club. Another example of her willingness to get involved with school and community can be seen when she along with a group of her peers managed to convert Junior Prom into a successful outdoor event through community outreach and hours of planning and execution. As part of CTL, she was able to assist with the expansion of the Tiger Closet, a project focused on giving students an opportunity to get access to necessities by turning in "Tiger Bucks", currency they obtain via attendance and good behaviour. She was also involved with other activities such as Ignition. Kelly will be attending the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of the Alan Arizumi Scholarship Honoring the Class of 1977 in the amount of \$2,000.



Sandy Truong: Like a lot of families, Sandy grew up being told that education should be her number one priority, if she does not do well in school she will fail in life. Her Nang (grandmother) immigrated to Hawaii with her mother to give her family a better life in Hawaii. Her grandmother dedicated herself to her family and helped raise Angel and her sibling while her parents worked long hours to support the family. Through the love received from her family, Angel was "motivated to aim for success and to follow my dreams" which is to one day be successful so she can travel with her grandmother and take her places that she has never been to. She states that "Seeing Nang makes me happy". Her drive through hardship can be seen at school where her teacher states that "Sometimes students have a lot to deal with in their personal lives and it is easy to let school take a back seat, but Angel did not and maintained excellent grades". In order to pursue her dreams, Angel has decided that she will join the military and serve her country before enrolling in the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Dr. Raymond and Carol Yap in the amount of \$1,500.



Elly Huang: Receiving an act of kindness can have a tremendous effect on one's life and shape their goals for the future. Elly was a recipient of an act of kindness that not only impacted her but also the lives of her family. During the pandemic, like many families, her family was impacted financially. During this time, her aunt stepped in and provided assistance despite her own financial situation. This act of kindness has shaped Elly's goal as she states "The gratitude I have towards her has pushed and motivated me to seek an education at the University of Hawaii at Manoa to pursue a Bachelor's degree in business. I want to use this degree to start my own business that will help provide homes and jobs exclusively for those in need, such as low-income family members, ethnic groups and homeless population". In order to pursue her dream she has taken many challenging classes as well as participated in the Key Club and Leo Club to participate in community service events. She will be attending University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Patsy Young in the amount of \$1,500.



Amy Ruan: Amy is described by her teacher as "someone who is committed to caring about other individuals, her school, her community, all in addition to her commitment to her own growth". She describes herself as someone who is always motivated to give in to others and putting everyone else before herself. However, through her years at McKinley High School, Amy has learned to not only take care of others, but to also care for herself and grow through all of her experiences, even her failures. She shows great maturity by saying that "I want to say failing is growing. They stick as the strongest memories, the most impactful lessons". She brings her experiences to the McKinley Band where she served as the Band Treasurer. She has also participated in many other activities such as Tiger Interact Club, Earth Day Beach Cleanup and Ma'ema'e Elementary School Campus Beautification. She will be attending the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Abraham & Shin Quon Wong Goo the amount of \$1,500.

He realized that "as an introvert and straight-A student, academics have not been much of a problem for me, socializing was". Realizing this, Grant has worked on prioritizing creating social connections, and he states that "I have realized there are certain people whom I hope to stay with throughout the rest of my life". He has created connections by joining clubs such as Leo Club, Environmental Club and has been involved in band for 4 years and served as a band officer and co-section leader. He took on the responsibility of taking attendance, scheduling one-on-one lessons for the underclassmen, and planning other events while participating in all of the ensembles of the band program including concert band, marching band, jazz band and symphony orchestra. He will be attending the University of Hawaii at Manoa. He is the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship Honoring Abraham & Shin Quon Wong Goo in the amount of \$1,500.



Chengjie Lin: High school is an important time in life where students learn how to build their knowledge, not only academically but also socially. Chengjie learned during high school the importance of education as well as the importance of friendships and of speaking up. During his junior year of high school, one of his best friends decided that he would quit school and work instead as work would give him the experience needed to be successful in the future. Although Chengjie was not able to change his friend's mind about school, he learned a valuable lesson that "Sometimes our friend makes the wrong decision, and that's when we should guide them. We as a friend should be helping each other out". He has brought his mature outlook to the classroom by participating in programs such as the school's first Pharmacy Technician Cohort in partner with Kapiolani Community College. Through this program he was able to participate in an externship in addition to sitting for the Pharmacy Technician Certification. He will be attending University of Hawaii at Manoa. He is the recipient of the Shiro and Jean K. Matsuo Scholarship in the amount of \$1,500.



Nicole Twigg: Nicole has been described by a teacher as “in the top of the class when it comes to maturity and perseverance. When it comes to matter of academics, she never displayed any sense of childishness as some students may when things are busy and difficult”. These characteristics mentioned by her teacher can be seen in her own self-reflection, where she mentions that “If I had the opportunity to go back in time to my freshman year, the advice I would give would be, to take the time to do the things that would make me a happier person because in the end, the superficial problems that I had didn’t matter and I missed out on being happy for a long time because of it”. Nicole has taken her own advice to heart and has made it her mission to participate in activities to make her happy, such as McKinley Band, Marching Band, Jazz Band and Art Club. Nicole will be attending the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of The Shigeru Okino Scholarship in the amount of \$1,500.

One of her teachers shares that “there is a student that sits near her that has few friends in the class. Whenever we have a turn and talk activity, she always thinks to include that student. I appreciate her help because usually it is my job to interact with these students. Lacina could move to other friends that she has in the class, but she conscientiously tries to include everyone”. Her compassion and empathy is also reflected in the clubs that she participates in such as Key Club, Leo Club, Go Green Club as well as the McKinley Blood Drive. She has truly exemplified her advice to herself of “just try and have fun with friends because time flies by fast and the next thing you know it’s only a couple of months before you graduate alongside some of the most amazing people you’ve met”. Lacina will be attending the University of Hawaii at Manoa. She is the recipient of The Shigeru Okino Scholarship in the amount of \$1,500.



Lucy Sun: Like many students, Lucy’s goal was to achieve good grades. She stated that “My academic goal was to be top student achieving a 4.0 GPA.” This pressure she placed on herself resulted in apathy towards most of her classes except History, which resulted in dropping of grades for some of her classes. Leihani Tabanera: Leihani is a student that has proven her strong work ethic and leadership. She has been a member of the McKinley Band for four years, and during her Senior year served as the McKinley High School Band Vice-President. In order to become an officer for the band program, a student must demonstrate leadership skills, good work habits and set an example of what it means to be a hard-working musician. Leihani was able to exemplify all of these qualities and accepted the role. Not only is she servicing as an officer, she is also the co-section leader for flute as well as the drum major for the school marching band. Leihani has been able to juggle all of her responsibilities as well as keep up with her academics. A teacher states that “Leihani’s commitment to her own growth and those around her will translate into an appreciation for and success in her college career and beyond”. 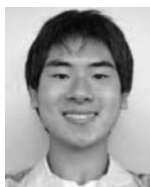
